Identify potential victims of modern slavery



### **Overview**

This standard is for workers who may be in contact with potential victims of modern slavery during the course of their daily duties. These duties may be carried out within an agency that is recognised as a formal referral point for modern slavery victims or it may be within other agencies that have contact with potential victims of modern slavery. It covers what you must do, know and understand in relation to the initial identification of potential victims of modern slavery. You will look for signs and indicators of modern slavery, and work with potential victims to address any immediate needs they may have. Potential victims of modern slavery may be adults, children or young people.

## Identify potential victims of modern slavery



### Performance criteria

You must be able to:

- 1. maintain an up to date knowledge of signs and indicators of modern slavery
- 2. identify signs and indicators of modern slavery in line with current guidance
- 3. monitor those whom you come into contact with for indicators of potential modern slavery in line with organisational procedures
- 4. communicate at a pace and level suited to the potential victim using recommended communication techniques
- 5. keep discussions free from judgement, discrimination and oppression
- 6. respond to cultural differences and needs in line with current good practice
- 7. seek further information discreetly to make informed identifications if required
- 8. identify any obstacles to disclosure in line with recognised good practice
- 9. take account of risks to potential victims that come from identification in line with the needs of the victims
- 10. identify immediate risks and needs of potential victims in line with organisational risk management and safeguarding procedures
- 11. address identified immediate risks in line with the needs of potential victims
- 12. maintain your personal safety and the safety of your colleagues at all times
- 13. make a decision on the need to refer or report potential victims of modern slavery taking account of all known circumstances
- 14. work within the limits of your role at all times
- 15. seek advice and support from appropriate others when the limits of your role are exceeded
- 16. record all findings in line with organisational procedures
- 17. share information with relevant agencies where there is a statutory or other requirement to do so and in line with organisational procedures
- 18. comply with the rights and requirements of confidentiality when working with potential victims
